Anyone can do a spotlight exhibit, hosted on Library Spotlight page; in terms of support, it's negotiated on a project by project basis. Timeline: Exhibits Committee accepts proposals any time and meets every other month. Exhibits can take several months of planning. Interactive features of Spotlight? Buggy; Lisa Weber is point person for Spotlight. General guidelines: What makes a good exhibit? What kinds of materials? Choose items that are visually/aesthetically interesting around a cohesive topic that you are enthusiastic about and will see through. Spotlight was developed at Stanford; more robust in terms of interactivity: https://exhibits.stanford.edu/dataviz Idea: start with Spotlight exhibit then when we're back onsite spin into physical exhibit. Aisha shared list of past exhibits to possibly inspire ideas. LCO has also done stories about Spotlight exhibits; way to promote collections/topics to Library as a whole and campus more broadly. Advice from Brian: It's going to take you longer than you think. Make sure you've planned out enough time for it! Opportunity to work with people you don't usually get a chance to work with.
