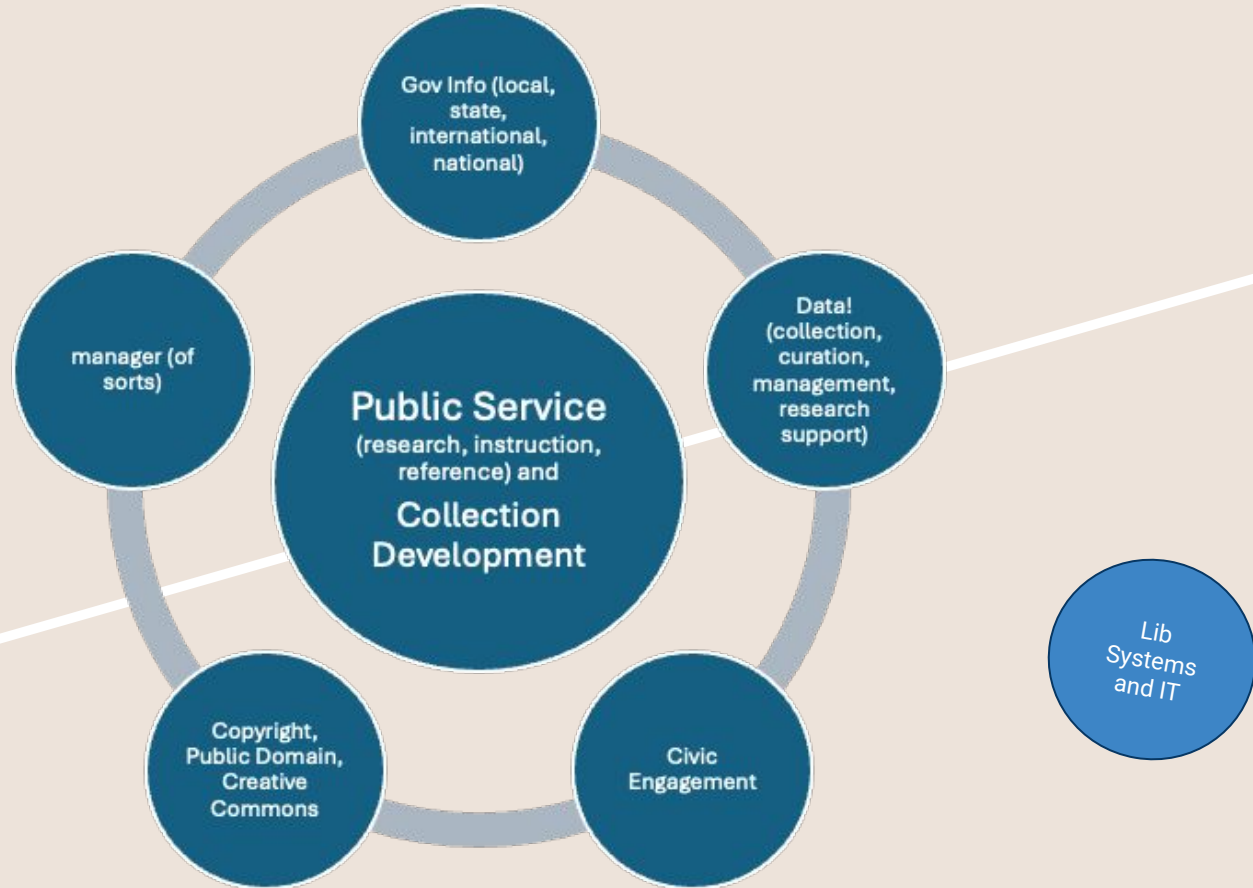

# A bit about me (professionally)



## ALA Key Principles of Government Information

- **Access to government information is a public right that must not be restricted by administrative barriers, geography, ability to pay, or format.**
- The government has a responsibility to collect, maintain, and disseminate information to the public.
- **Government information regardless of form or format should be disseminated in a manner that promotes its usefulness to the public.**
- **Depository library programs must be preserved** to provide equitable, no-fee access to government information for the public.
- **The cost of collecting, collating, storing, disseminating, and providing for permanent public access to government information should be supported by appropriation of public funds.**
- The role of private publishers should complement government responsibilities in the collection, storage, and dissemination of public information. **Private sector involvement does not relieve the government of its information responsibilities.**
- Government information policy must ensure the integrity of public information.
- It is essential to safeguard the **right of the government information user to privacy and confidentiality.**
- Government has an obligation to preserve public information from all eras of the country's history, regardless of form or format.
- Government has a responsibility to provide a comprehensive cumulative catalog of government information regardless of form or format.
- **Copyright or copyright-like restrictions should not be applied to government information.**

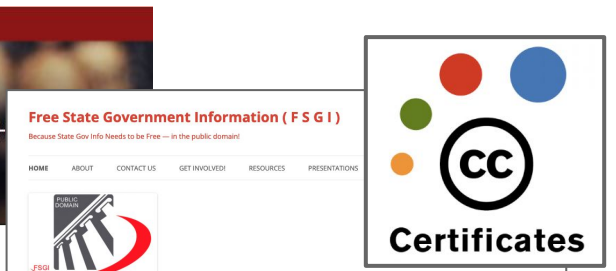
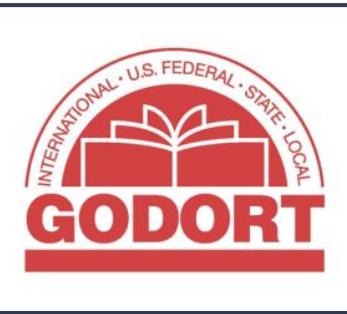

### Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, Justice:

The library “as place” should reflect back the diversity of the student, staff, and faculty in such a way that says this is your space, you belong here.

The library “as collections” should represent the breadth and depth of scholarly discourse, seeking to include and uplift the voices, ideas, writings, viewpoints of those communities who have been systematically marginalized.

- Who's voice and viewpoint is not included or being reflected?
- What assumptions am I making about an individual or group of people - and where did those assumptions come from?
- Am I acting with implicit bias? Am I acting with explicit bias? How has dominant US settler colonial culture influenced my language, my understanding of the world, and the ways I react?
- Do my actions and words cultivate mutual respect and uplift the people I interact with?
- Do I (or others in the group) have access to information, resources, etc. that gives us an unfair advantage over others in the group?
- Are we all working with the same set of assumptions and understanding?

"Contrary to popular belief, state agencies do have the right to copyright their publications."  
 -Margaret T. Lane, "Selecting and Organizing State Government Publications" 1987.

Even if states do not actively place a copyright mark on their publications, 17 U.S.C. Code Section 102(a) automatically places them under copyright. Additionally, states do have the ability to actively copyright their publications. Unfortunately, most state laws are ambiguous and often unknown, even by agencies within their state. FSGI is seeking to clarify these policies and ensure the widest possible access and use of state government information.

**Introduction**

Welcome to the *Civic Switchboard Guide*, a living document designed to help libraries become more engaged in their local civic data ecosystems. This work is the product of an Institute for Museum and Library Services funded project called *Civic Switchboard: Connecting Libraries and Community Information Networks*.

We believe that strong partnerships between libraries and other local civic data intermediaries better serve data users, further democratize data, and support equitable access to information. This guide aims to support libraries and civic data intermediaries to establish and grow these partnerships. Over the project's two-year period, this guide will evolve as we gather lessons about roles and relationships from civic data partners in the field.

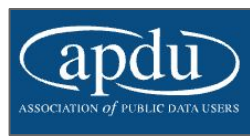

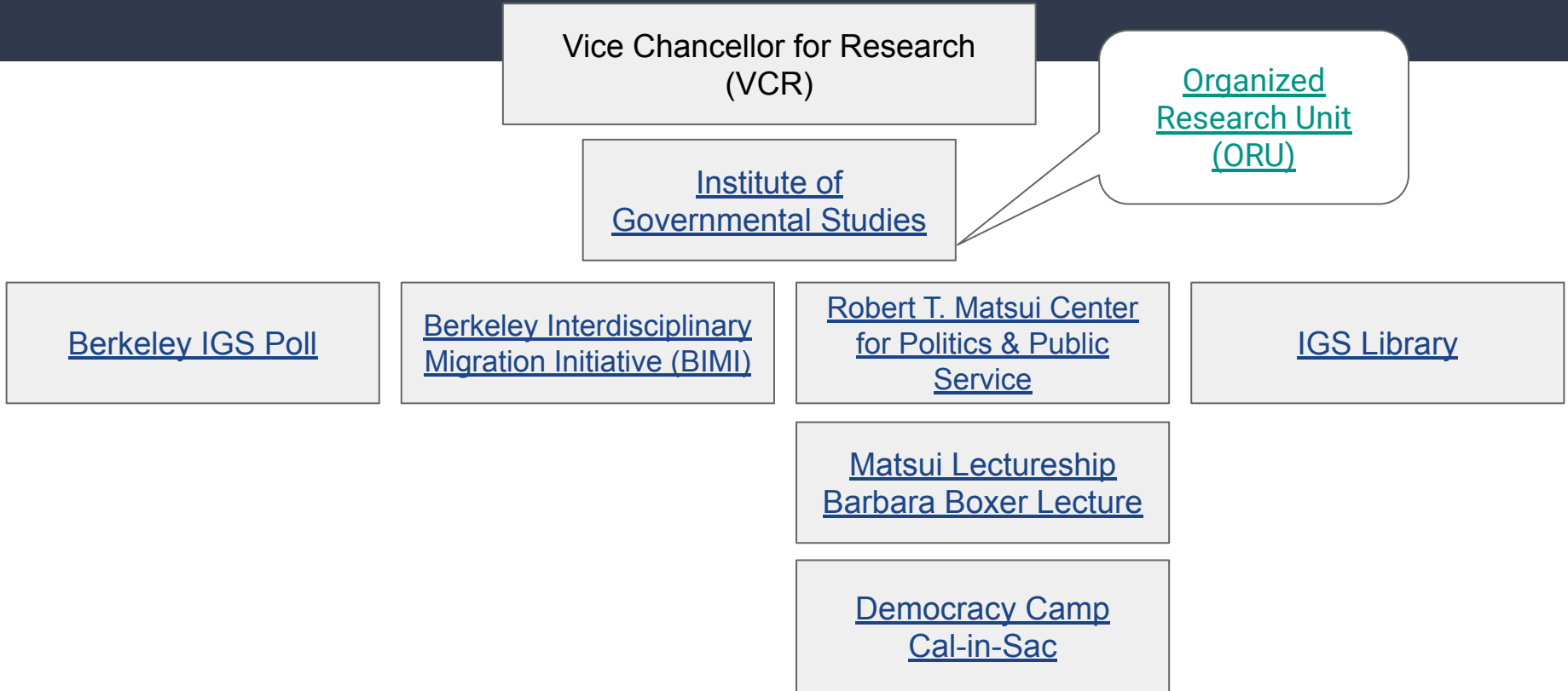

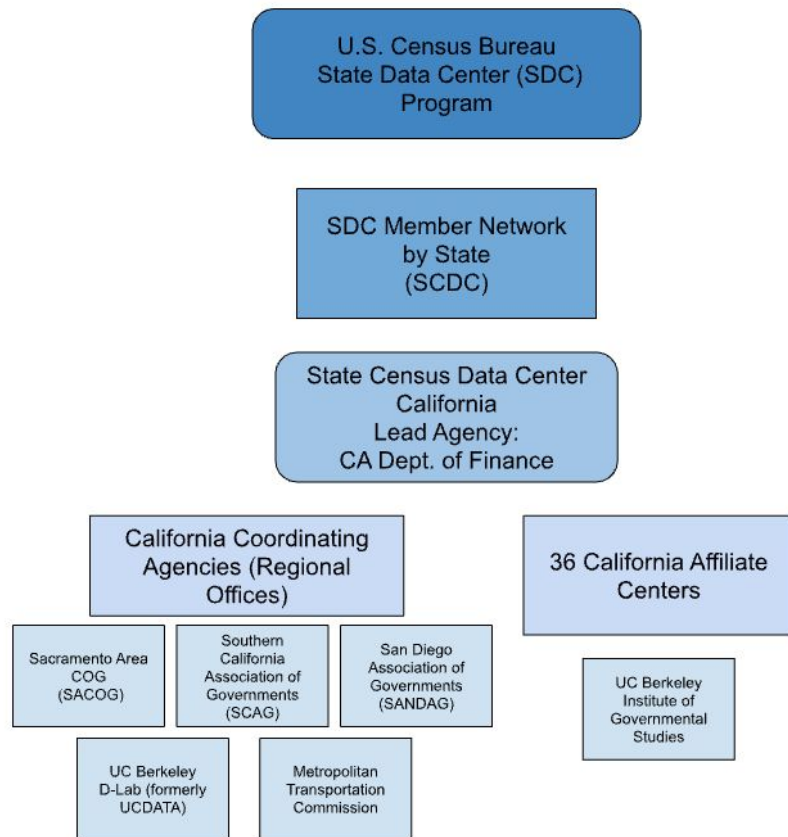

**50110.** The legislative body, and each office, officer, or employee of a local agency shall furnish the clerk three copies of each printed, mimeographed, or processed book, pamphlet, report, bulletin, or other publication issued by them at the expense of the local agency. The clerk shall send one copy of each publication to the State Library at Sacramento, the Institute of Governmental Studies of the University of California at Berkeley and the Public Affairs Service of the University of California at Los Angeles, to be preserved for reference use in those institutions.

**50114.** The legislative body may make reasonable provision to pay for copying the books, documents, maps, and records, not exceeding the amount authorized for copying and recording the originals, and such copying is a charge against the local agency.  
(Added by Stats. 1949, Ch. 81.)

**50115.** Unless another provision of law requires a longer retention period, the clerk of the legislative body may destroy or otherwise dispose of any paper or document filed with or submitted to the legislative body more than one year previously, unless the legislative body determines that there is a need for its retention. In determining whether there is a need for retaining a paper or document, consideration shall be given to such factors as future public need, the effect of statutes of limitation, and historical significance.
